**Blue Books** - 1874-1939

**Census Reports** – 1851 - present

**Colonial Secretary Office records** Colonial administrative files, 1814-1954.

**Council Papers** Various government departmental reports, 1877-1961.

**Hansard Reports** The official verbatim record of Parliamentary proceedings from 1990 to present.

**Indentureship Registers** East Indian Immigration Registers – 1845-1917, Chinese immigration Registers – 1852-1866.

### Land Ownership Records

Administrative records pertaining to land and property, 1851-1947.

**Laws of Trinidad and Tobago** 1832-present.

**Maps** A small collection of maps including maps of the cities of Port of Spain and San Fernando.

**Microfilm Collection** A collection of some of the earliest British colonial records on microfilm.

**Newspaper Collection** Selected holdings of major national publications, 1821 to present, including the early Port of Spain Gazette, The Chronicle and the San Fernando Gazette.

**Photographs** A collection of black and white prints originating from the Government's Information Division.

**Private Collections** The private records of Andrew Carr, Charles Gocking, Captain J.B. Saunders, H.P. Singh and the Trinidad Lake Asphalt Company are available.

**Registry of Slaves** A collection of records pertaining to the Slave Registry established from 1812.

**Trinidad Royal Gazette and Trinidad and Tobago Gazette** The publication arm of the Government from 1825 - present.

**Yearbooks** A comprehensive annual record, with index, of public and commercial life, and events, 1882-1969.

## National Archives' inscriptions on UNESCO's Memory of the World Register

Two collections housed at the National Archives – the Documentary Heritage of the Indian Indentured Labourers and the Registry of Slaves of the British Caribbean 1817-1834 – have been inscribed on UNESCO's Memory of the World International Register. The Register lists documentary heritage of world significance and outstanding universal value, based on selected criteria.

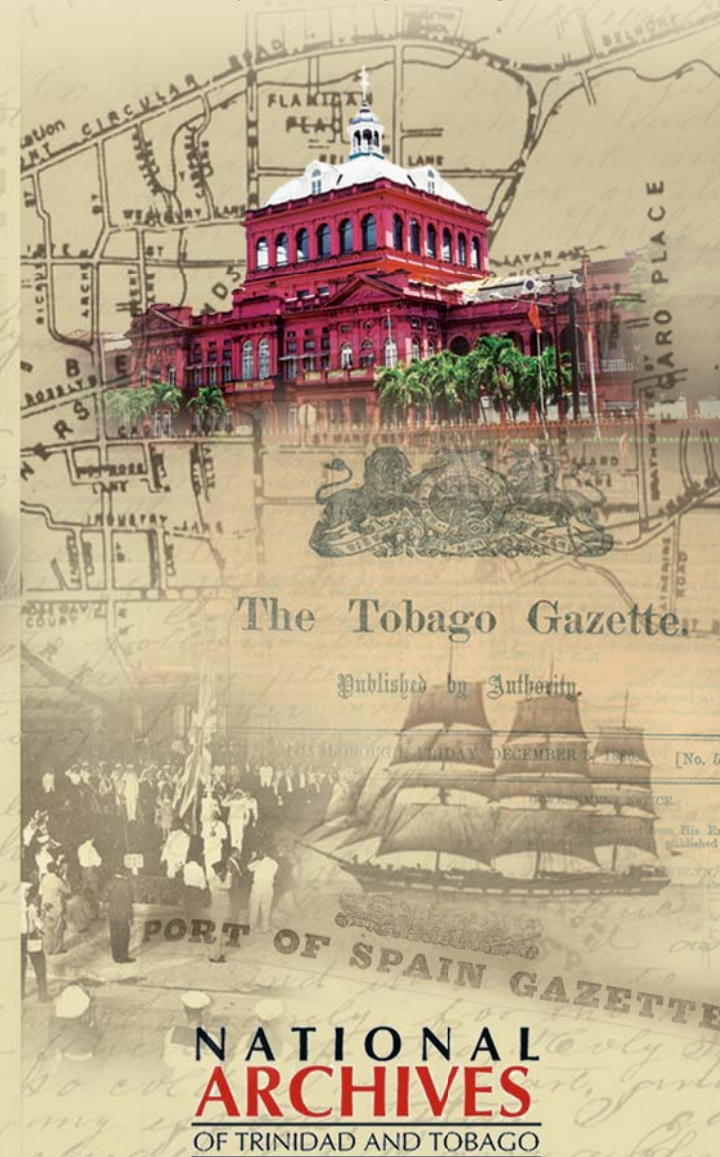

## SERVICES

### REFERENCE



Access to the National Archives' collection is available to all members of the public through our reference service. Researchers may consult records in the Search Room in accordance with Search Room guidelines.

### RECORDS MANAGEMENT



Records management training and advisory services are provided to Government ministries and agencies, including the provision of guidelines on the preparation of Records Retention and Disposition Schedules. The Government Archivist is the only officer who can authorize the destruction of Government records.

### OUTREACH



The National Archives engages with individuals and communities to bring them closer to their history and documentary heritage. This is usually done through in-house exhibitions, lectures, tours and the hosting of an annual Archives Awareness Week, but activities at other venues may be facilitated upon request.

### CONSERVATION



A well-equipped in-house conservation laboratory ensures that restoration, preservation, and conservation work, which includes disaster recovery, are undertaken to safeguard the nation's archival records for future generations.



Established in 1960, the National Archives houses records dating from the 18th century to the present.

### Some items of note include:

- The oldest newspaper, The Port of Spain Gazette, and the first issue of the Trinidad Guardian.
- The General Register documenting the arrival of the East Indian indentured labourers.
- The Registry of Slaves.
- The original contracts of Chinese indentured labourers.
- The Register of Baptisms, Marriages, Deaths of the English Protestant Church, Tobago, 1781-1817.

A small reference library collection, including a collection of rare books, on the history of Trinidad and Tobago is also available.
